

# Simple and efficient

The house sits a few feet below the elevation of the street, allowing its simple gabled roof to rise no higher than its neighbors. The footprint of the house - a simple 32-foot-by-54-foot rectangle - draws its dimensions from the 1960s-era ranch-style house next door. A covered carport, rather than a garage, gives depth to the street view.

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New residential construction typically follows a familiar pattern: big and boxy, with ornamental touches such as porches or fake shutters that help them fit in or look established.

Not so with architect Art Lin's latest project, a cozy retreat inside the Raleigh Beltline that reconciles a contemporary aesthetic and respect for its neighbors with a lot of space.

At about 4,200 square feet, the Lin home has an open floor plan. The house - a relatively shallow 32 feet deep and only 54 feet wide - sits on a steeply sloped site, which helps to minimize the visual impact of its three stories, all under a simple gabled roof. The main entry is on the middle level, and a master bedroom with home office is upstairs. Below is a spacious basement a well-lit space with plenty of room for additional bedrooms, a den, playroom or even an additional work space.



The beauty of Lin's project is its simplicity and relentless efficiency. Built for \$76 per square foot (except for the framing, concrete and electrical work, Lin did most of it with his own hands, Lin used money-savers such as IKEA cabinetry and bookshelves to establish dimensions that everything else became based upon. The strategy, he estimates, saved him more than \$35,000. Lin used the Internet to shop for deals on everything from kitchen appliances to sliding doors, and he used simple aluminum pieces available at home improvement stores to make transitions between materials or to create counter edges.

The house is plenty big enough to accommodate the activities and daily rituals of Lin, his two children and his wife, who works from home. And it's all done with simple grace and modern efficiency
